## ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING REVIEW

**The NOGS AGM took place** on Monday 26<sup>th</sup> October 2002, and here are listed some of the highlights of this important meeting in the NOG calendar:-

- ◆ The Chair stated that it had been a good year for Newport Outdoor Group following the problems caused by the Foot and Mouth outbreak the preceding year. One indicator of this was that there had been increased attendance at events.
- ◆ Fourteen new members had joined during the year.
- ◆ Unfortunately Kay no longer has time to participate in Group activities but she thanked the Group for the warm welcome she had received.
- ◆ The sad death of David Bartholomew was noted and his major contribution to the organisation of the challenge walks was mentioned.
- ◆ The Black Mountains Roundabout challenge walk raised £1,800 for the Mountain Rescue team. It was pleasing to note that five members completed the walk.
- ◆ Nineteen people camped in Gower prior to the Gower Gallop which 18 members participated in.
- ◆ The Christmas and New Year events were well attended and thoroughly enjoyed with twenty-eight members of the group staying over the New Year at Borth Youth Hostel.
- ◆ Fifteen members went to Spain for a week in June.
- ◆ Dave Green and others had bought a dinghy – they are happy for group members who are swimmers to sail with them on Llandegfedd reservoir.
- ◆ For next year the Chair hoped to generate more publicity, create a welcome pack and conduct a members survey.
- ◆ Photographs are requested for the Group scrapbook.
- ◆ The finances of the group are healthy but it was noted that the resources are depleted through the year and are subsequently increased by income from the Talybont Trial. (As a consequence of this the Chair had to pay for the New Year Event using his own money because there were insufficient group funds!)

- ◆ £150 has been ring-fenced for purchase of a replacement computer.
- ◆ The Black Mountains Roundabout made a good profit because of a high number of entries and reduced expenditure. It was suggested that, as far as possible, the mailshot for challenge walks be done electronically to reduce costs and effort.
- ◆ Additional expenditure this year was for liability insurance which is for group liability and is not personal injury insurance.

- ◆ It was noted that there were no minutes from the previous AGM. It was agreed that the AGM minutes should be produced soon after the meeting and be made available to members. A file should be set up containing relevant Group paperwork including a list of equipment owned by the Group.
- ◆ Dave Green has managed to get a Capacity Building Grant of £4,960 to cover (a) consultancy work to look at reducing probability of accidents and lessening liability (b) training. The Grant can only be spent on these activities (not equipment) and findings must be shared with other similar groups.
- ◆ The Millenium CD is now available for £2.
- ◆ A recommendation of a charge of 15p per mile for car travel expenses was agreed.
